MINUTES OF PREVIOUS AGM:

SECRETARYS REPORT:

Club Secretary Mag Malone presented her report for the year (copy attached) outlining all the activities and people involved.

Mag was thanked for her excellent report and her work throughout the year.

TREASURERS REPORT:

Club Treasurer Pat Sutton presented his report (copy attached) and talked through the various costs and income lines. In particular thanks went to Kieran Lalor/Meadow Court Stud for their support and to Austin Brannock and the work he does with Intel and of course Domenico in The Well who is steadfast in his support.

Pat was thanked for his report and his work throughout the year.

CHAIRPERSONS ADDRESS:

As chairperson I would like to thank everyone for their support during the year. There were no major issues and anytime a helping hand or advice was needed it was generously given.

The new split season with the underage running off the even age groups first and then the uneven has worked reasonably well. Some teething issues but overall, more manageable than trying to do everything together. For the senior teams the compressed county schedules did allow for the county championships to be run off early but perhaps a bit too compressed in Kildare as the year concluded for the vast majority of clubs in early September.

Thank you to all our members, coaches, mentors and administrators for helping over the year and thanks to our GAA and LGFA secretaries, Mag Malone and Rita Kehoe, who coordinated it all with the County Boards and County Committees.

Facilities

Thanks to Nathan Wall who have kept the place cleaned up and tidy over the last year. Nathan is working with us on a back to work scheme and the good news is that the Club got an extension and Nathan will continue with us until September of 2023.

Late last year the club was awarded a government/lottery Sports Capital & Equipment grant to go towards the purchase of a new grass mower. Between the mower and secure storage this represents an investment of around €32.6k for the Club and the grant covered nearly €30k of that. The mower was delivered at the end of 2021 and I think its fair to say that over the year has contributed significantly to having a much better-quality playing surface.

All in the grounds were mowed approximately forty-eight times and thanks to James McGowan in particular who did the majority of the grass mowing over the year. There is around twelve acres and each time it takes between an hour and a half and two hours.

Before we got our own machine for this year Billy Whelan cut the grass for a good few year. Billy did a good job and was always fair and very reasonable with his costs. Thanks very much to Billy for that.

Thanks also to Kevin Brannock and Ciaran Delaney who helped line out the pitches. The first line out of the year is the time consuming one as there is a lot of measuring and guide twines involved. After that it's a case of keeping them remarked before they disappear. The pitches were lined out approximately twenty times over the year and while it was taking about two and half hours each time the investment of c. ξ 700 is a new spray line marking machine has reduced that to just over an hour.

After more than ten years of delays a long-term lease with the Community Field Trustees and the Suncroft Community Development Group for the main pitch area, the area the club has been using since the mid 1970's, was executed in June of this year. This will put the Club in a far better position for long term planning and when applying for grants from the GAA and other funds. The lease has been an ongoing saga and annoyance for over a decade now and it is great to have it resolved. Thanks to Fergal Lalor -SCDG board- and John Moore -field trustees- for all their help in getting this concluded.

The disused Kildare County Council wastewater pumping site, down from the back of the back pitch, now belongs to the Club. The Club applied for this site some four years ago for a storage area and the transfer from Kildare County Council concluded at the start of this year. The site is approximately half an acre and with a bit of work will be very useful as a secure storage area and it has an access point off the public road.

Suncroft Community Development Group, with a telecoms company, got planning permission and erected a telecoms structure at the bottom of the GAA pitch during the year. The GAA Club is supportive of this as the funding that this could generate for the Suncroft Community Development Group would be a great help to them and lift that fundraising burden from the community, and the structure will provide much needed mobile phone and broadband coverage to the surrounding area. A track in the ground did get compressed by the construction traffic and it will take a bit of time for this to come good.

Suncroft Community Development Group have received a grant of circa €35k to go towards the development of a walking track and the Club will work with them to increase the fund and hopefully develop the track in 2023.

Overall, serious progress had been made with facilities over the last decade and the club is now in a good place. In the short term we need a few improvements like ball nets at the back of the goals and longer term the next big job is the development of the surface on the back pitch.

<u>Football</u>

On the football front this year our first competition game was on the 23rd of February, and we are playing our last games in the next week or so. By the time 2022 closes we will have fielded teams in just over 230 competition games and had just under 300 different players, 250 underage, will have played.

Our priority as a club is to have as many members as possible of our community out playing football, however it is also nice to have a bit of success now and again as well.

In addition to the 3 county titles Mag mentioned (senior reserve league, U17 ladies & U16 lads) we also lost 2 finals and lost 6 semi-finals and our Minor ladies and U23 lads are in semi-finals on Saturday.

Not many competition wins but at the business end of thirteen competitions, playing competitive and challenging football, right across the age groups which is the most important thing.

Senior Lads

After a good year in 2021 our senior lads team got promoted to Division 3 for the league, but they had a poor league. For most of the league games key players were unavailable due to county duties, a couple of long-term injuries and another couple were out of the country. Should have had enough to stay in Division 3 but a couple of losses to key teams in the early games put them on the backfoot and they are back down to Division 4 for 2023. They reached the preliminary quarter final of the Intermediate Championship which was a good recovery from the poor league.

On the positive side the average age of the players that started in the last championship game was twenty-one and the overall senior lad's setup increased player numbers again in 2022. This year they managed to put out a second team in both the league and championship (winning the reserve league Division 4).

After five seasons Niall Whyte has stepped away as manager from the senior lad's setup. It was in a bad state when Niall took over and thanks to his, and his management teams, work over the years the future is looking much brighter. Ollie Brannock, Alan Middleton, Noel Poole, Danny Whelan, Mikey Harnett, Tommy Deveraux, Tommy Sheehan, Pa Tierney, Tadgh Begley, Noel Birchall and Joe Morris to mention some of the people that worked with Niall.

On a small budget it's a difficulted job to get a management team together that is as independent as possible from family and other local loyalties and that will give long term development as much focus as quick wins. I would like to particularly thank Des Brannock and Mickey Harnett for their work on the committee. I would also like to thank Val Dillon, Michael Stynes, Pat Sutton, Anthony Rainbow, Cillian Brennan, Seamus Dillon, and John Brown who all provided input and assistance during the process.

After a wide trawl of the county and further afield the selection process for a new manager for the Senior lad's setup has completed. John McCormach has been selected and he will bring an assistant with him and there will also be two club selectors. One club selector, Derry Enright, has come on board and we are currently working on a second. John has been managing and training teams of various grades in Kildare, Carlow, and Wicklow for 20 years. Teams that have won leagues and championships at Minor, Junior, Junior A and Senior A and he was also a selector/coach with Moorefield when the won the Senior Championship in 2013. John will bring all that experience with him and we wish him, the management team, and players all the best for 2023.

One of the major problems identified back in 2017/18 was the lack of games for minors and young adults <u>not</u> on the senior team and addressing this, and other issues, has really helped retain players and build numbers.

Fair to say that the issue is resolved, and we can stop talking about it but we have to keep an eye on it as it could very easily start to reverse. Keeping the Reserve/2nd Development Team Going for League & Championship is critical.

Senior Ladies

Our senior ladies were back down to Division 2 for the league and in the Intermediate Championship for 2022 and had a good year. After a slow start to the League, they were unlucky to lose out on a place in the final of the league and then they lost out on a place in the Championship final. They played some great football with a lot of very young players and really held their own in Division 2 and at Intermediate level. With all the young players coming through and maturing it won't be long before they are knocking on the door of Division 1 and Senior Championship again.

Sean Dunne, Seamus Brady and Dorothy Doyle have committed to another year and Kevin Brannock is stepping away after a number of years involved. Thanks very much to the management team for their work and particularly Kevin who has put a lot of work into the team, and into the club, over many years.

<u>Underage</u>

As Mag has already outlined another good year at underage with two county titles, two finals lost, and four semi-finals lost so far. The most positive element is that we were very competitive right across the age groups, and we again increased our number of players

Player numbers were good again in 2022 we have managed to grow bit by bit. Not big increases but there are always players dropping off at the top and coming in at the bottom and the key thing is to keep the numbers growing. Hopefully in 2023 we will break the 300 player mark.

PLAYER RETENTION

Getting underage players in is a job and we must do a bit more with the schools especially. Keeping players long term is the most important and challenging thing for coaches and the club. A lot of parents/guardians and some coaches are way too obsessed with winning at the younger ages and this drives away players and does a lot of long-term harm to player numbers for the club, and it is not good for children to be driven away from sport.

The first hard transition for an underage player is from small to full size pitch, that's also small team size, to full team size. Irrelevant of the players ability when playing full size pitch at say U13 or above you need as many players of that age as possible. A year or two years is massive in relation to physical development at that age and for the full size pitch every team need as many players as possible at the age level.



Example: In 2016 we had 12 players on U14 team aged 13 or 14. 3 still playing in 2022, 75% drop off.




Example: In 2016 we had 24 players on U14 team aged 13 or 14). 14 still playing in 2022, 42% drop off.

The GAA has been at this for some 140 years and all the research and experience clearly demonstrates that a focus on winning at underage is damaging to player retention. Low player numbers result in a lack of competition for places, a lack of focus on personal development, a lack of personal responsibility and poorer long term team outcomes.


A focus on winning can result in:

- A lack of fun for all players and when one player leaves their friends often leave with them, particularly prevalent in the ladies.
- Players of the same age do grow and develop at different times and in an environment where winning gets priority many players leave before they have a chance to properly develop.
- An over reliance on players that are good at a young age can detract from their development. Often it can just be that some kids can hit puberty a couple of years ahead of others. With winning the priority the strong players are guaranteed a start, are not challenged to improve themselves, a level of indiscipline can be accepted, etc.
- A lot of early developers drop away at 17, 18 and 19 as they have not developed to their full potential and are not prepared mentally to make the second hard step which is to compete for a place on a team for the first time.
- Important to keep strong players grounded and to keep all players involved until they are fully developed.

During the Peak Height Velocity years, where coordination is not the best with many players, it has to be all about fun, skill development and keeping players playing. Time enough for intensity, fitness and winning when they are older and nearing full development.

<u>County</u>

As Mag has already mentioned Suncroft were again well represented on county LGFA and GAA teams. At underage level it is all positive as players do learn a lot by being involved with county panels and the county commitment of players doesn't really impact on the club.

A senior level it can be hard for the club, especially as the senior and minor teams to compete in the majority of the league without their county players. This year the senior lads panel had three players tied up with county for most of the league. The senior ladies had two.

To finish off talking football I wan to mention the highlight of the year which was Hanna Murphy's all Ireland U16 win with Kildare. Congratulations to Hanna, we are all very proud of her.

Committees

<u>Fundraising:</u> Mag Malone, with help from Pat Sutton, ran most of our fundraising efforts this year and all the events undertaking met or exceeded expectations. Paddy Behan got the lottery back up and running and has done a great job in getting it going again. It is a much needed and steady income for the club.

Thanks also to all the ticket sellers, especially Paddy Behan & Mary Val Dillon who always come up with the goods.

<u>Ladies:</u> Sandra Dillon chaired the ladies committee again for 2022. Not always straight forward but Sandra, with help from the lady's secretary, Rita Kehoe, have done a great job, thank you Sandra.

<u>Underage</u>: Noel Sammon chaired the Underage committee again for 2022. Again, not straight forward all the time and with the split season for the first time. Noel did a great job, especially in recruiting new coaches, thank you Noel.

<u>Senior Lads</u>: Des Brannock, Fionn Dowling, Ciaran Troy and particularly Mickey Harnett did great work for the Senior Lads sub-committee. Those of us close to it could see progress year on year and now it is starting to show on the field. Thank you to Fionn, Ciaran, Dessie and Mickey.

Coaching

The club had 67 people involved in coaching and thank you to all those people for giving their time to the kids and the club. Thanks also to Tanya Duignan for again organising the Cul Camp.

One thing that we have to address across the club is training for coaches. Until recently only a handful had any formal coaching training but in 2021 some progress was made and again more progress in 2022. The GAA and LGFA requirements are that every coach has a minimum of the Level 1 Foundation qualification and a high percentage have Level 2 and Level 3 qualifications. We have to make every effort to achieve this.

Every person that gives their time to coach, or help coach, a team is greatly appreciated, and it is hard to get people to give that level of commitment.

Saying that most coaches cycle through the system with their own kids, start off at U7 or U8 and finish off at U17 or U18. They go through the cycle only once and many only see near the end of the cycle, often when it's too late, the consequences of their poor coaching practice and decisions back in the earlier years. We have to get Coaches to do the coaching courses and learn from the experience of all the coaches that went before them. It will never be perfect, but it is extremely frustrating seeing well meaning, hardworking, coaches, making the same basic mistakes again and again.

Thank you to all the coaches and helpers and a very special thanks to Trish Tobin for yet another year of dedication to the clubs youngest.

Child Welfare & Protection

Thanks to Caroline Bailey who continued in her role Children's Officer and took up the role of Designated Liasson Person (DLP) during the year. One of the key jobs of the Children's officer is to spot and head off issues before they become a problem and Caroline has done a fantastic job with this.

Garda Vetting Child Safeguarding Coach Training

Will continue to be the cornerstones of Child Welfare and Protection and I would like to thank Caroline and all the coaches and parents for working to make the club a good and safe environment for children.

<u>Finance</u>

Unfortunately, what we do costs money, and the grass keeps growing and the insurance has to be paid and bills keep coming. I would like to thank everyone who put their hand in their pocked in any way to support the club's activities. Meadow Court Stud stood firmly behind the club again this year as our main sponsor and the club would like to thank them for that ongoing support. Also, a big thank you to Austin Brannock who did a super job with securing significant funding from Intel again this year. Dom & The Well again were great with their ongoing support.

In 2022 we had a golf classic and made the most of the National club Draw (Thanks to Aoife & Stephanie) and the Kildare Club Draw where Ciaran Dowling won the car. The Murphy weekend was back, thanks to Sean Murphy and Tony Howard and we had a few other small fundraisers. The ladies table quiz being a standout success for a one evening and relatively easy to organise event.

The Club got a covid grant contribution towards our Public Liability Insurance and also a one off €5k contribution from Telecom's operator for helping to facilitate the telecoms structure. The new mower also reduced our grass cutting costs.
